

Online Safety

In the past week there have been many press stories about a particular nasty challenge circulating with a scary image on social media. These stories are based on an urban myth / hoax which circulates every few months. Our advice is that you do not show any scary images from the newspapers to your children in order to talk about it, and do not mention the challenge by name. Instead talk about what to do if they see something scary or someone dares them to do something stupid or dangerous; who they would tell and make sure they know never to forward these things to their classmates.

Five tips to protect your child from viral challenges

- 1. Discuss the online trends among their peers and find out about what games their friends are talking about. It's important you understand what websites, apps, and social media platforms they are on to help them minimise potential risks.
- 2. Have regular conversations with your children about the risks they may be exposed to and how to deal with them, such as cyberbullying, peer pressure and grooming, and ensure they feel able to come and talk to you if they see anything upsetting.
- 3. Check their privacy settings. Make sure they know how to make their profiles 'private' so they are not sharing personal information to strangers.
- 4. Make sure they know when and how to report and block any malicious or inappropriate messages or posts on the platforms they use.
- 5. Advise them to be careful about over-sharing personal information such as their school, telephone number or anything that identifies where they live and consider not using their full name for their profile.
