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Nursery and Reception



Year 1/2

This week, Mrs. Owen has worked with the children in Years 1 and 2 to develop their ability to listen with concentration and understand the sounds that a variety of percussion instruments make.


The children experimented with sounds by stopping and starting on different signals and experimenting with the volume, pitch and tempo of the sounds that they made.



















Watercolour workshops at Learning

On Wednesday and Thursday, we were lucky enough to be visited by watercolour artist, Clare Robinson. Clare taught workshops for groups of children in years 3, 4, 5 and 6 as well as a selected group of talented artists from the infants. The children learned how to carefully observe the objects and about pattern, line and colour identification. They were then taught to carefully mix the colours that they needed and to add paint to their sketches to add detail and texture. The paintings that the children created are beautiful.





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In Spanish this week, the children have learnt how to say: "hello, how are you"? "I'm fine, thank you", "what's your name"? And "my name is".

They started the lesson by singing a simple Spanish

song called 'hola'. Next, the children used their listening skills to hear the words being spoken by a Spanish person, followed by them reciting the words. Once they felt confident in saying the words in Spanish, they had a go at having a simple conversation with their 'talk partner'. Finally, they completed a worksheet that required them to fill in the blank speech bubbles to show what they thought the children were saying. This task allowed them to reflect on their learning and attempt some writing in Spanish. The children should know how to say 'hello' to their teacher and classmates, how to say 'my name is' and how to ask somebody their name.





























This term in RE the children in Years 5 &6 have been considering the question 'If God is everywhere, why go to a place of worship?'

As part of this enquiry they have been learning about where and how different religions worship.

This week they were learning about Christianity and features you might see inside a church.

They were able to make comparisons between the religions we have already explored: Islam, Judaism and Sikhism.

They enjoyed working in groups to recreate the features of a church. One group turned the classroom into a church and the other build one out of Lego which they labelled with the key features.









Warwickshire Fire and Rescue Service visited Year 1 and Year 5 on Wednesday. They taught the children about the role of the fire service and answered general questions. They also taught the children about how to identify hazards within their own homes and what to do in case of an emergency.

Your child's attendance at school is important.

The law entitles every child of compulsory school age to an efficient, full-time education. It is the legal responsibility of every parent to make sure their child receives that education either by attendance at a school or by other education. Where a child is registered at a school, parents have a legal duty to ensure their child attends that school regularly.

Your child must attend school every day, the exception being if they are too ill to attend (for example, diarrhoea, vomiting or contagious illness). If your child feels 'under the weather', they must attend school (we would always call for them to be collected if their condition deteriorates). Routine appointments (optician, dentist etc.) should be booked for school holiday times and in the case of urgent and non bookable appointments (hospital, audiology), time away should be minimal (i.e. the child should be in school before and after the appointment).

National research shows that pupils with the highest attainment in school (as a group) are those that attend well.

It is the school's responsibility to monitor the attendance of all pupils and address any concerns. We work with the attendance compliance team and cases of persistent absence are reported. Fines may be issued by the Warwickshire Attendance team.

This week, we will email the attendance certificate of all pupils to their parent(s). This will detail your child's current attendance % and show the days of absence. Except in a very small number of exceptional circumstances, attendance below 95% (above 3 days absence) is unacceptable.

Christmas Theatre Visit Nursery, Reception, Year 1 and Year 2


