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Nursery and Reception





Reception and Nursery's learning theme this half term is 'Starry Night'. This week we have explored what makes a good bedtime routine and why this is important.

The children have also found out about the famous artist, Vincent Van Gogh and have looked at a variety of his work. Following this the children made their own starry night pictures by painting onto foil. This has helped them to develop mark making skills and to explore painting using different materials.

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Internet safety

On Thursday, our Online Safety ambassadors led a whole school assembly. They shared a short puppet show that they had written, practised and recorded. This taught the children some important safety messages about how to engage in online games safely.

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1. Only play online games with the knowledge and permission of your parents.

2. Play your games where an adult can see and hear you.

3. Only use the 'chat' function with people that you know in real life and who you trust.

4. If chatting to friends online, always be polite and kind.

5. Tell an adult straight away if you are playing online and you feel uncomfortable, upset or unsafe.



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All children have an afternoon of Physical Education (PE) led by specialist coaches from Onside Coaching each week. Mr. Rellis is the coach that most frequently visits us at Lighthorne Heath Primary School.

PE is important because, as well as the physical skills (set out in the National Curriculum) that are taught to children, PE challenges and promotes self-esteem through the development of physical confidence, resilience, perseverance and a positive mind-set.

This week in PE, the children in Years 1 and 2 have been learning to control a ball using a hockey stick. They learned how to pass correctly, hold the stick and how to aim the ball at a target. They played games called 'Three Lives' and 'Tackler' to build up their turn taking and team player skills.



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Year 3/4

Children in Years 3 and 4 started the week with a memorable experience linked to their new topic, 'Playlist'.

Mrs Bazeley spoke to the children about her personal experiences as a musician. She explained how she began her journey by learning how to play the recorder in primary school, and consequently, she learnt how to read music. She then went on to play the violin during secondary school. Her brother, who was also interested in music, was impressed by her skills and encouraged her to consider playing a brass instrument; still to this day, Mrs Bazeley plays the tenor horn.

Mrs Bazeley is also a member of a band and shared with the class a piece of live music performed by the band. She also shared pictures of her, her family and her friends performing at music events. This gave the children an opportunity to ask questions, such as how do you play a recorder? What is a brass instrument? How can I learn to play an instrument?

Following on for "Show and Tell", the children were invited to bring in any instruments they had at home. It was a chance for the children to share their knowledge and experiences with the rest of the class.

The children learnt about different instruments, the role of a composer and new vocabulary, such as percussion, string instruments and pitch.










2023 marks the 400th anniversary of the publication of Shakespeare's First Folio, the first time his



plays were brought together in one book. Without this folio, many of Shakespeare's most famous plays (including Romeo & Juliet and Macbeth) could have been lost.

The Royal Shakespeare Company (RSC) want to mark this anniversary by selecting and celebrating a new series of 37 brand new plays that reflect the world we live in today. These will be performed at the RSC or their theatre partners across the UK. So as a class, we are working on our own entries to the competition.

As part of our work towards the RSC's 37 plays project, the children in Years 5 and 6 have been brainstorming ideas, observing people for character ideas in their own observational journals and making mood boards using the art technique of collage. They have used the methods of professional writers to help build characters and a setting in which their play can take place.

The mood boards will be used as a working document that the children can add to and refine their ideas throughout the writing process.

This unit of work has an English focus and is teaching the children to develop their ideas drawing on their own research as well as to consider how authors have developed characters and settings in what they have read, listened to or seen performed.


Emotional Wellbeing and Mental Health



On our January INSET, staff received further training from the Educational Psychologist Service to continue our journey to become an attachment aware and trauma informed school.

Colleagues were introduced to a number of approaches that focus on thinking, feeling, communicating and behaving in a manner that cultivates feelings of safety and security for all children, this allows us to build on our established good practice to provide more focussed support to children who require additional support with emotional regulation. Staff had the opportunity to discuss ways that we can support children to

understand their own feelings and to help our children to understand ways that they can ask for help and put self help strategies in place if they are dysregulated, upset or overwhelmed
