What a busy last week of term we have had in Year 1 and 2!

We started the week with an exciting visit from The Gaydon Fire Service, who delivered a safety talk to the children. The children learned about the importance of smoke alarms, how to stay safe in a smoke filled room using the 'stop, drop and roll' technique and how to raise the alarm in the event of a fire. They also got a special invitation to sit inside the fire engine and learned about the types of tools and equipment used by the firefighters.

The children have also been very busy working with volunteers, Cathy Stacey and Emma Hills to plant new trees in our forest schools area. This enabled them to consolidate their learning about trees from our previous topic 'The Enchanted Woodland.' They were keen to ask questions such as "Is this tree deciduous or evergreen?" and "How tall will they grow?" to find out more about the types of trees they were planting.

In class the children have been learning about space rockets as part of our topic 'Moon Zoom.' This week they learned to make air propelled rockets, by folding paper and inserting a straw. Following this they took part in an investigation to find out 'Which is the best sheet material to make a rocket out of?' We tested a range of rockets made from; foil, card, tissue paper and wrapping paper, by launching them from an air propelled pump to find out which would fly the furthest. The children concluded that the rocket made from the lightest paper, the tissue paper, made the best material for an air propelled ocket.













Year 3

In music, the children in Years 3 and 4 have been working on a project this term that required them to create artwork, poetry, and music inspired by a piece of orchestral music. The children listened to the orchestral performance of 'A Bao A Qu' from Anthology of Fantastic Zoology. Afterwards, they were asked, "What was that music describing?" Then it was explained that it described an imaginary animal.

In groups, the children were tasked with creating their own imaginary animal by thinking of a real animal (tarantula) and then thinking of a second contrasting animal (elephant). They were encouraged to divide these words up so that they could see the syllables, and then choose syllables from both words to put together, creating a new word. For example: 'TU-LA-PHANT.'

Next, the children were asked to think about the animals they had created and write down the following about them: three colours, three things the animal does, three sounds the animal makes, three emotions the animal feels, three things in the animal's world (i.e., its home, food, view), and three other characteristics. Then they were challenged to fashion these words into a three-line poem about their animal.

Finally, they turned the imaginary animals into music using a range of instruments. They had to choose three things that their creature does and invent a short musical sound (motif) for each of these things. They put these short sounds together to create a brief piece that describes their animal, thinking carefully about the order.



















This week the children in year 5/6 were visited by the Warwickshire Fire and Rescue Service. During this hour session the children refreshed and built upon their existing knowledge and understanding of fire safety behaviour and was intended to develop their awareness and response.

They looked not only at fire safety, but also at accident and hazard spotting around the home. By the end of the session, the children were able to talk about causes of fire, how to be lessen the likelihood of causing a fire in their homes, what to do if they were in a fire or saw a fire and why hoax calls are so dangerous.

Thank you to all of our wonderful parents for the support that you have given us during 2023 and the kind words and messages at the end of this year.



Unfortunately, we still have an unacceptable number of pupils for whom attendance and punctuality is causing concern.

Our school monitoring records show a clear correlation between children with poor attendance and those that do not make the academic progress that we aim for.

Children should be in school every day (the school day begins at 8.55am and they should be ready to enter the classroom at this time).

Children should attend school <u>every day</u> and should still attend if they feel tired or are a little 'under the weather'. Sibling and family illness is not an acceptable reason for absence. For more serious or contagious illnesses (vomiting bugs, diarrhoea, chicken pox etc.) then any absence from school should be reported (by telephone or email) to the school office.

Mental Health in Schools Team (MHST) Tips For Wellness:

LEARNING

Learning a new skill can be exciting and incredibly rewarding. You might have lots of questions: 'Will I be good at it?' 'Will I get it wrong?' 'Where do I start?'

However, when we have a go at learning something new it can help us to feel happier and healthier, as well as distract us from everyday worries and events. Learning also gives the mind a chance to switch off, it gives us a sense of purpose, an opportunity to connect with others, and can boost our self-belief and confidence!

Our tips for learning:

- **1- Upskill:** you could improve a skill you already have, such as learning a new football trick, dance move, baking a new recipe, or learning a new sewing technique.
 - **2- New skill:** learn something new altogether! Ideas for new skills could be origami, coding, a musical instrument, photography, tai chi, or learn a new language.
- 3- Skill swap: with a friend or family member, take turns to teach each other a new skill!
- **4- Re-discover a skill:** re-discover a hobby you used to enjoy when you were younger, e.g., you could join a sports club that you used to play, practise puzzles, colouring, or playing piano.


Being a parent is exciting and rewarding but there are also times when they behave in ways that challenge.



Classes will begin on 19th January till 22nd March excluding half term.


