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Healthy Schools

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This week, in Early Years as part of our Big Wide World topic we've been looking more closely at our local environment before comparing it with other places in the world.

We talked about the changes that are taking place in Lighthorne Heath with the current building work. The children were then tasked with making a record of creatures and natural objects that can be found on our school field.

The children looked closely and we found so many things. We will be using this information to help us think about what we can look after and help protect for the future.

The children have really impressed us all with their ever-developing knowledge and skills surrounding rhythm and pulse as well as their musical vocabulary and ability to explain their ideas.





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Emperors and Empires

In our history lesson this week, we were learning to explore everyday life in ancient Rome.

Children worked with their partners to devise a list of at least five research questions aimed at helping them learn more about everyday life in ancient Rome.

They were encouraged to consider various aspects of daily life, such as homes, family structure, school, leisure activities, clothing, food, types of jobs, and different types of people in society.

Their agreed-upon questions were then written down on the whiteboard. Some of these questions included: Did Roman families have pets? Why did the Roman Empire end? What did the Romans make?

Next, the children were challenged to answer their questions using provided materials, including information books and websites. The children then recorded their findings into a word document using the copy and paste feature. The children found out:

• The Romans had different kinds of pets than we have today. Some of the pets included greyhound dogs, ferrets, small monkeys, blackbirds, nightingales, parrots, and other breeds of animals.

• Romans constructed roads, bridges, and aqueducts, which helped to grow and fuel the fast-spreading empire, with the assistance of ancient Roman concrete.

• Most historians believe that the Roman Empire ceased to exist as an entity when Germanic leader Odoacer defeated the last Roman Emperor, Romulus Augustus, in 476 AD, to become the first King of Italy.

During the Christmas holidays, we ran ushthorne Hears our first HAF club (free for children in receipt of Free School Meals).







Respect

Respect is important in our lives because it helps us develop a sense of self-worth and improves our general wellbeing. This in turn will enable us to develop healthy relationships with others.

If we look at Maslow's hierarchy of needs, respect is part of ensuring that we have high selfesteem. When you respect yourself, this enables you to be open to new opportunities that will help you reach your personal goals. If you feel confident in your own worth, you are more able to recognise when others are not treating you well. Scan the QR code below to watch a video about Maslow's hierarchy of needs!

Being kind and respecting others enables them to feel valued and can also make us feel better.

Our tips for respect:

- Listen to each other's point of view and recognise that it is OK if you do not agree with someone else's opinion.
- Try to keep discussions about the topic and not about the people who are sharing their views.
- As a class, create an agreement and list the ways you would like to be respected by each other in school. You could all sign your name and pin this on the classroom door to remind you about how to be respectful!
- 4. In pairs/small groups, act out a role play to show how you can be respectful towards others. Remember, respect can be shown in lots of different ways so try and think outside the box!
- Create a poster about how you can show respect outside of the classroom too. Think about what you could do at home and in the community.

Did you know that claiming free school meals means that your child will get access to free school holiday activities and food?

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Can I apply?

Your child could be eligible for free school meals if you get any of the following:

- Income Support or Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support from National Asylum Support Service (NASS)
- Guarantee Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (with no Working Tax Credit) with an annual income of no more than £16.190
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)
