



In our Science lessons we have been learning about habitats, micro-habitats and the basic needs of animals and plants to enable them to survive in their habitat. In this week's lesson we looked for microhabitats within our class garden. The children worked in pairs to record the living things they found using a tally chart. They then recorded these in a bar chart to show which living insect or plant was the most popular in their chosen microhabitat. The children also helped to set up a class wormery, which has enabled them to observe how the worms move, feed and react to sunlight and temperature changes in a micro-habitat.




We learnt that a habitat is a place where plants and animals live. Different habitats have different groups of plants and animals living in them.















Lighthorne Hears



This week in topic lessons the children have been learning the difference between a geocentric and heliocentric model. They learned about how ideas had changed through history and how advances in science helped to prove or disprove scientists and astronomers' theories. This was made possible with the invention of the telescope which showed that the Earth (and the other planets of the solar system) orbits the sun. This orbit around the sun is what gives us our years, and the rotation of the planets on their axis are what gives us days.


