

In English, the children have completed a unit of work based on the book 'The Secret of Black Rock', by Joe Todd-Stanton. The story is about a girl called Erin who is trying to uncover the truth behind the mysterious legend of Black Rock. She is told that it is a huge, dark and spiky mass that destroys any boats that come near it. Throughout this unit of work , the children have been learning about repetition, inverted commas, fronted adverbials, onomatopoeia and similes. Then they independently wrote a sequel to the book based on Erin wanting to revisit the sea with a friend. When she returns to the sea, Black Rock takes them to a cove where they discover a mermaid paradise. First, the children drew a story mountain to help them plan their beginning, build up, problem, resolution and ending. Next, they wrote a draft of their initial story and then edited it by checking their punctuation, grammar, spelling and vocabulary. Once they were happy with their drafts, they



completed their polished versions.

## Year 5/6

The children have enjoyed learning about Sir Isaac Newton this week. They have found out about some of his amazing discoveries: The three laws of motion and most famously the laws of gravity.

Inspired by this learning, they created some fantastic abstract art. Using a variety of tools (and of course gravity) to create their art, the children used watered down paint to make splatter patterns which were then turned into apples, like the apple that inspired Newton's theories on gravity.



As a school that embraces reading for pleasure at the heart of our curriculum, we are delighted to inform you that we have recently invested in new, high-quality home

reading books. These include phonetically decodable practice books that match our Department for Education

recommended phonics scheme, Floppy's Phonics as well as fiction and non-fiction books across all book band levels. There are a range of texts that cover classics, humour, facts and also offer opportunities to reflect.

The new books follow the Oxford book band levels and colours, for which you may notice there is a slight variation in colours for children reading at a higher level. You will also see that within some book band colours there are levelled steps to add progression through vocabulary and comprehension. There is also an overlap between some levels that repeat (8-12). This is a unique feature of Oxford Reading Levels, the consideration of text difficulty and children's emotional maturity. Having Levels 8-12 in Year 2 and 3 means that we are able to provide suitable books for

very capable 6–7-year-olds and books that are less challenging but still age-appropriate for older children who are reluctant and/or slower to progress.

Class teachers are now busily checking your child's level and some parents/carers may notice that their child appears to have been brought back levels or bring a levelled book when they are a

'free reader'. This is to allow the children the opportunity to experience our brilliant new books and our staff to check for those higher-level reading skills. Children, along with those who are 'free readers' are still encouraged to read books of their own choice that interest them.

Please look after our lovely new books and enjoy reading!

This week's reading super star is Leo in Reception again. We hope you enjoy taking our reading bear and star bag home, Leo.

#### Persistence


