Super Star Readers!



This week we have been learning about plants. We looked closely at a common plant found in the school garden. We identified the basic structure and labelled each part; **root**, **stem**, **leaf** and **flower**. We learned that leaves make their own food using the sun, the process of **photosynthesis**. We looked closely at the tiny hairs on the roots of the plant and found out that these help soak up the **nutrients** from the soil as well as helping support the plant as it grows. We made our own plant, flap books to record what we had learned.











BE SURE TO GET INTO SCHOOL ON TIME! Our school day starts at 8.55am

- * 5 minutes lateness per day = up to1 whole DAY missed every TERM.
- * 15 minutes lateness per day = 2 whole WEEKS missed every YEAR.
- * 50 minutes late once a week = 1 whole DAY missed EVERY HALF Term
- * 50 minutes late ONCE a week = 1 whole WEEK missed every YEAR.
- * 50 minutes late every week = 90% attendance over a year.

MHST tips for wellness Change

This week's theme is Change.

Change is a natural part of life! We are changing all the time. Changes can make us feel happy or excited. But some changes can also be challenging and make us feel worried. Some good questions to ask yourself when you are worried about a change might be "what am I worried about?" and "can I do something about it?"

Try one, or both, of the below activities throughout this week.

- 1) Do you have any changes coming up that are causing some worries? Try to write them down and put them under 2 headings: 'What can I change?' and 'What can I not change?' If you have no control over the coming change, you can focus on accepting that it will happen.
- 2) Sometimes it helps to talk to someone. Think about the changes you are going through or will be going through. Is there someone you can talk to about this? Maybe a teacher or family member? Sometimes we don't need advice, and just want to let something out. If this applies to you, try writing down your thoughts. You can either share these with someone you trust, or rip up the paper and throw it away.

At the Royal Shakespeare Company


On Tuesday 14th December at 7.15pm
