In the Long Ago project your child will learn about their history and how they have changed from when they were babies. They will learn about their family history and heritage and find out what life was like when their grandparents were children. They will learn about what it was like to go to school in the past and how everyday objects, such as clothes, toys and vehicles have changed.

Supporting your child at home

Look at photographs of the children as babies and discuss how they have grown and changed.

Look at family photographs so the children can see family members when they were children.

Talk about what your life was like when you were a child. Share and discuss the <u>Did you know?</u> resource.



Hop on board a big, red bus and head for England's capital. Yes, that's right, we're on our way to London! This half term, we'll take tea with the Queen and visit Buckingham Palace online. Using maps and research, we'll locate Buckingham Palace, understand compass directions, plan routes around London and learn about the countries of the United Kingdom. Our research will take us back in time to the Great Fire of London and to famous London landmarks, as well as giving us an understanding of what it's like to live in a big city. We'll Skype a school in a city far away, write adventure stories, take a virtual trip to London Zoo and make souvenirs for tourists.

At the end of our project, we'll share our skills and knowledge with you. Our class will tell well-known stories about London, make a stop-motion animation and share traditional British songs and nursery rhymes. **Help your child prepare for their project**

Cities are exciting places. Why not visit a local city to spot interesting vehicles, buildings and landmarks? Alternatively, you could search the web for images, information and film clips about London and keep a scrapbook of your findings. You could also visit the local library to see if you can find some colourful books of nursery rhymes and traditional songs to enjoy together. thorne H

Darwin's Delights Year 4/5/6

Ship ahoy! We're off on an exciting journey with Charles Darwin and his crew on the HMS *Beagle*. During this half term, we're going to investigate a range of animal specimens, describing the characteristics of the creatures, and labelling their body parts using software. We'll use a range of non-fiction books to investigate adaptation, natural selection, variation and inheritance. After examining letters and journal entries written by Darwin, we'll write our own examples. We'll collect natural items and discover what plants live around our school. We'll retrace Darwin's steps using maps and create sketchbooks to record the plants, flowers and trees we encounter Using maps and globes we'll plan an expedition. What will the weather he like and what physical

we encounter. Using maps and globes, we'll plan an expedition. What will the weather be like and what physical and man-made features might we encounter?

At the end of the ILP, we'll think about why the Galapagos Islands developed such diverse animal life, and why they might be under threat. We'll also think about what Darwin would have worked on if he were alive today. How would he use our technology?

Help your child prepare for their project

Charles Darwin was a world-renowned naturalist, geologist and physicist, and we're going to follow in his footsteps. Why not collect samples of plant life from your garden and see if you can identify them? You could make detailed sketches of the plants you find, just like Darwin. Alternatively, visit a museum that has fossils on display. What can you learn about the animals from which they were formed?

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Nursery and Reception

This week we have started our new topic called 'Long Ago'. We have started to develop our understanding of the past by learning that this could mean things that happened earlier in the day, yesterday, last year or a long time ago before we were even born! The children looked at some objects that have changed over time and had a go at deciding which were modern, old or antiques. It was really tricky, but everyone had great ideas to contribute which helped us to decide in the end. We also had fun looking through photos of babies and were delighted to discover that they the children's own baby photos. As part of this we talked about the children had changed since they were babies.

This week we have launched our new topic 'Bright Lights, Big City' by finding out about The Queen. The children were given an envelope with a mystery person to identify. They worked in teams to build the

They recorded facts they had learned about Queen Elizabeth in pop-up books and illustrated these too, taking care to present their work neatly, using their best handwriting.
