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Dear parents and carers,

It's difficult to believe we are already nearly in to the last week of this school Year! It was rudely interrupted by the global pandemic, but still, it has rushed by! It is always a busy time in the school calendar, but feels uniquely different this year, with so many of our lovely children not yet back. We are so sad not to be able to do all the usual year end activities, and we are determined to make the new school year start in September as positive and routine as possible.

We will be sending your child's End of Year Report out early next week, so keep checking your emails. We will also prepare home learning activities for children to continue their learning over the Summer Holiday. These will be basic skills based, concentrating on reading, maths facts fluency and spelling.

The quicker we can get children reading the basics using their phonics, so that they can access more challenging and interesting books independently, the better. Our aim is to make them read fluently, with understanding and FOR PLEASURE.

As the summer holiday approaches, although we are mindful that it does not feel like the usual break for many of our families, it is probably more important than ever that the children keep reading routines going and read on daily basis. It is so easy to lose the confidence and the cumulative reading skills that build up if reading is not done regularly.

With this in mind, every child, including our remote learners will be receiving next week a personalised Reading Response Journal to complete over the summer holiday.

It is intended to be used like a diary-/scrapbook. It will contain suggestions and ideas of how your child can respond to what they read over the holiday. It is meant to be a nice project for them to do each week, and then to share when they return to school in September.

Dear Families.

Summer Food Fund - Edenred School Meal Vouchers

As you may have heard in the news over the last couple of weeks, children who are entitled to benefits related free school meals will receive support over the summer holiday period.

Each eligible child will receive a voucher to the value of £90 at the beginning of the summer holidays. This is made up of £15 per week, per child (for the duration of the school summer holidays).

You will receive a separate voucher per eligible child and it has been decided that vouchers do not need to be redeemed in a single shopping trip, they can be used repeatedly until the voucher balance reaches zero.

We have been advised that the process to redeem your voucher is the same as you have been doing previously. You will receive an email from no-reply@edenred with details on how to redeem your voucher. Please check your spam/junk folders if you do not receive an email.

Key scheme guidance

The eCode must be redeemed into an eGift card before it is used in store, please see the parent/carer user guide for details.

- Please take particular care if emailing the eCodes to the family directly from the system. If you enter an incorrect email address, you will need to cancel the eCode and order a new one.
- Some supermarkets have a maximum limit of £200 for each eGift card, so please order separate eCodes for families with more than 2 eligible children
- Vouchers do not have to be redeemed in a single shopping trip they can be used repeatedly until the voucher's balance reaches £0. To check how much money is left on the eGift card, families can ask the supermarket's customer services team when in store.

remember what that means






Vulcan Bubble



Vacancy for Parent Governor

Sadly, Kully Deol will be stepping down from her role as Parent Governor at the end of this academic year due to work commitments. We would like to say a huge "thank you" to Kully for all her hard work and dedication to the governing body. She has shown great commitment to our school and made a real difference to our pupils. She will be sadly missed!

This means that we have a vacancy for a parent to join our governing body.

What do governors do?

Governing boards have to monitor and evaluate progress towards the school's priorities and targets, support the head and staff as well as challenging their expectations. Governors will attend meetings (six per academic year.) During the meetings, governors will be expected to ask questions and discuss topics after having read the associated papers and documents. In addition to this, governors may be asked to take on the responsibility of a "link governor" and have a special responsibility assigned to them, such as SEND or health and safety. No one governor is expected to know everything as the strength of a governing board lies in its ability to attract and rely upon members from a wide variety of backgrounds. All duties/ responsibilities are shared amongst the members of the governing board and, as a group, decisions are made and acted on.

What are the benefits of becoming a governor?

Making a positive difference to the life chances of pupils at Lighthorne Heath Primary School. Having a sense of purpose and knowing that you are helping our school.

Developing new and transferable skills.

Getting to know and giving something back to the local community.

Making new friends and colleagues.

What skills do I need to become a governor?

Have the commitment and the desire to secure the best possible education for pupils.

Have time to read papers, attend meetings and visit the school.

Act with fairness, tact, diplomacy and integrity.

Have good interpersonal skills and be able to work as a team.

Be able to analyse, interpret, question, make judgements and help take decisions.

Be confidential and honest.

What support is available to me?

Warwickshire Governor Services offers training, support and advice to all all governors from induction through to chairing the governing board. All governors work as a team and they receive support from each other and in particular from the chair of the governing board, the clerk to the governing board and the head teacher.
